Permanent Supportive Housing

St. John Center expanded its Permanent Supportive Housing program by opening Sheehan Landing in 2025, creating 80 new single-site units for previously unsheltered people who now have the support they need to live at home, for good.

This year at St. John Center, we have seen how those small acts of good—done with love and persistence—can transform lives.

For two years, Jerry came through the doors of our Day Shelter, his voice often raised in frustration and pain. Behind the shouting was a man battling untreated mental illness, the pull of substances that offered only fleeting relief, and the crushing weight of life on the street.

This spring, Jerry moved into Sheehan Landing. With a safe apartment, the right medication, and space away from the constant pressures of street life, Jerry has found peace. Today, instead of shouting to be heard, he is reaching out to connect with others in healthier, gentler ways. Jerry's story is just one, but it captures what happens when housing, care, and compassion come together.

The past year has been full of these moments of change. We opened the doors to Sheehan Landing, creating 80 new homes for people who had spent far too long in shelters or encampments. Our Day Shelter remained a place of welcome and possibility, where guests found not only basic necessities but also a community ready to help them take their next step home. The Outreach team continued meeting people where they are, offering hope and practical support in encampments across the city.

At the same time, we deepened our commitment to recovery and healing. With new support from Louisville and Kentucky Opioid Abatement Funds, we expanded programming that connects guests to treatment and helps prevent overdose. We launched new tools to ensure our outreach is responsive and people-centered. And we strengthened partnerships, welcoming groups like the Public Defender's Office into our Day Shelter to stand alongside people navigating the challenges of homelessness and criminalization.

We celebrate what has been achieved, but our vision stretches further. The road ahead calls us to keep expanding housing, growing recovery connections, and building a stronger safety net of community partnerships—so that more people, like Jerry, can find peace and the dignity of home.

Thank you for offering your "bit of good." Together, we are overwhelming despair with hope and creating a community where home is possible for everyone.


